6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision

To develop, nurture and promote the college as a centre of excellence in higher education that is accessible to marginalised and disadvantaged sections of society, to cultivate and sustain an ambience for the full development of the creative and intellectual faculties of the students, to equip and endow them with skills for facing challenges in life and to transform them as socially responsible individuals who uphold the values of equality, tolerance, secularism and democracy.

Mission

To provide the best possible ambience and opportunities for the full development of the inherent capabilities and personality of the students and other members of the community.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:**6.3.1 Curriculum Development**

The curriculum of the institution is designed by the University of Calicut which largely follows the core values adopted by NAAC.

The college fosters the needs of advanced students through the Walk With a Scholar mentoring programme

Students who need additional attention for academic progression are given special classes through the Scholar Support Programme and remedial tutoring.

Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) is conducted for promoting soft skills among students.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The college follows the guidelines set by the University of Calicut and the Government of Kerala in its admission procedure.
- Considering the greater demand for seats in our college compared to nearby government institutions, we are striving to bring new courses to the college.
- All programmes follow the Choice-Based Credit Semester system
- Ease of access to learning is ensured for differently-abled students through facilities like wheelchairs and wheelchair ramps.
- The availability of N-List, EDUSAT facility, and well-equipped general library ensures that students have the best possible access to knowledge resources.
- Strict insistence on hourly attendance ensures that the academic progression of the students is constantly monitored.
- Students who are struggling to meet their academic goals are given special attention through tutorials.
- A total of six national/ regional seminars/ workshops have been conducted by the various departments of the college in the year 2016-17
- Leadership skill and management skill of the students are encouraged through works like entrepreneurship development club.
- Participation in NSS also boosts their skills in teamwork, self-esteem, and self-expression.
- Participation in nature club sensitised the students about the significance of environment

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Class tests are held as the course progresses.
- Assignments are also given to assess the intellectual calibre of the students.
- At the end of each academic year, a model examination, funded by the PTA, is conducted.
- Joint session of the teachers, parents and wards is organised to evaluate the performance of students and to take remedial measures if needed.
- The class-wise P T A is organised where the parents and teachers meet once in every term to assess the progress of the students.
- The college has a tutorial system under which a set of students is assigned to a group tutor. The system facilitates better interaction between the students and teachers. Every week a tutorial hour has been set aside essentially for this purpose.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The college has postgraduate programmes in History. Although no research centre has been established at the institution, our dedicated Research Committee consistently monitors the availability of research facilities at the college and based on its recommendations several infrastructural and other improvements have been made in the past years to facilitate research among faculty and students.
- The research facilities available in the college Centralised Computing Facility, high-speed broadband internet connectivity, N-LIST, EDUSAT video conferencing, an annually updated general library and basic facilities like printing, copying, and scanning.
- The college has applied for upgrading the Department of History to a research centre.
- The college is planning to start an online peer reviewed multi-disciplinary journal where faculty, student and research scholars can publish their research papers and findings.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Modern facilities available at the college include a computer lab, internet facility, EDUSAT facility with video conferencing ,N-List, LCD projectors, desktop/laptop computers, interactive smart boards/ ceramic white boards and printer/scanner/photocopiers in every department, and a Seminar Hall with a capacity of 100 persons.
- The college has an indoor auditorium for conducting various programmes. The indoor auditorium has a capacity of 200 persons.
- The college has an annually updated library with a large collection of books, various journals and a good collection of digital resources.
- Majority of the classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Self appraisal was collected from all the newly joined teachers, for forwarding it to the director of Collegiate education for declaring probation.
- IQAC has collected the feed back from the students and analysed it.
- At the beginning of each academic year the College council reviews the existing staff pattern and vacancies if any and recruits guest personnel for filling-up the vacant teaching and non-teaching positions by obeying prescribed procedures of the Govt.
- New recruits are motivated to attend orientation and training programmes periodically.
- Recreation programmes are also organised for teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The faculty members are appointed by The Public service Commission of Kerala as per the norms laid down by the U.G.C., the state government and the university. The process involves a written examination followed by an interview of the successful candidates in the exam. Merit is the only criterion of appointment. Many of the teachers are university rank holders and quite a few are PhD/ .M. Phil holders even before the appointment.
- If the required number of faculty is not available; the college has provision for appointing guest faculty on a temporary basis. These temporary appointments are done strictly on the basis of merit and the vacancies are notified through local news dailies.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

- The college has an efficient policy on waste management that follows the principles of segregation at source and composting/recycling. Students are made aware of the fact that the only way to effectively manage waste is to cultivate a lifestyle where wastage is kept to a minimum. All waste products generated in the campus are classified as either “red” (non-degradable) or “green” (degradable) and separated at the source itself, i.e. they are deposited in the separate bins provided for each category in different areas of the campus. The green waste is processed in the bio-composting unit while the red waste is collected in the zero-waste management plant.
- The NSS Units and Nature Club, collaborating with Perambra Grama Panchayat, have enabled rain water harvesting facility in the land available in the campus by digging rain pits.
- Green protocol is followed in all programs and celebrations conducted on campus.
